Cultural Bus Tour—Saturday, April 28, 2018—KING TUT!



The Friends of the Thousand Oaks Library is happy to announce a Cultural Bus Tour to the California Science Center in Exposition Park on April 28, 2018 where we will view KING TUT: TREASURERS OF THE GOLDEN PHARAOH. This 100-year celebration of finding King Tut's Tomb is premiering here in Cultural Events Southern California with an outstanding exhibition Coordinator of over 150 artifacts. Sixty of these pieces have

never been out of Egypt.

The presentation will include multi-media works that correlate with some of the findings from Tut's Tomb, such as jewelry and gold artifacts. Shown also are the results of scientific studies of the King's remains that update what we know about his health and lineage. These new technologies have been helpful in locating other tombs and verifying facts of tombs that were excavated earlier.

We will begin the day at the onsite I-Max movie theater, seeing "MYSTERIES OF EGYPT" on the seven-foot screen to introduce us to the finding of the King's Tomb.

We'll board the bus at the Newbury Park Library at 2331 Borchard Ave at 9:45 A.M. and will leave at 10:00 A.M. The return to Newbury Park will be approximately 4:30 P.M. The cost of this trip is \$62.00 for members of the Friends and \$67.00 for non-

members. Lunch is on your own at the Trimana Market and Coffee Bar or you may bring your own as there is indoor and outdoor seating. The prices at Trimana are in the \$6-\$12 range for sandwiches or wraps, burgers, hot dogs, crispy fish or chicken baskets, salads or soups. Mexican food, pizza, side orders, drinks and desserts are also available.

Arlene Bradley (pictured at left with Audrey Helix) has the happy distinction of being the Friends of the Library's most senior volunteer. Arlene has been associated with the library since 1986, and a volunteer since 1991. When her family first moved to the area, Arlene came to the library once a week for reading

material for herself and her children. On one fateful visit she was given a tour of the library, and encouraged to become a Friend—and the rest, as they say, is history.

Arlene moved to California from Massachusetts in 1941, and obtained her degree in social work from UCLA. She and her husband built their first house themselves, near Box Canyon, living in a trailer until it was completed. Over the years, Arlene has seen a lot of change come to the area, but one thing hasn't

changed—her dedication to the Friends of the Thousand Oaks Library. "The books are wonderful," Arlene says. "But it's the people who make the difference. The people I work with are why I get up and come to the library every week. It's definitely the people."

These days Arlene takes the Dial-A-Ride from University Village to arrive in time for her weekly Tuesday morning shift, working with Audrey Helix on the Daily Used Book Sale's stellar children's book collection. It's the time of year, once again, to solicit nominations for the Friends Board of Directors and Committee Chairs. The elected officers and the appointed Coordinators are described below.

The FTOL Board meets monthly with Library staff to discuss library needs and new initiatives. Please consider putting your hat in the ring!

President: Prepares the agenda and presides over the monthly Board meetings; appoints Committee Coordinators; represents the organization at Library and community activities; maintains communication with Library staff

Vice President: Serves in absence of the President; coordinates Annual Meeting; assists Board as needed

Secretary: Takes and maintains minutes of monthly meetings; serves on Budget Committee

Treasurer: Collects and disperses all monies; keeps financial records; reports monthly to the Board; files tax return; chairs annual Budget Committee

Membership VP: Processes new and renewal memberships; maintains the membership database; sends renewal notices; coordinates

membership recruitment

Book Sales VP: Schedules, coordinates and supervises all book sales; supervises Book sorters

There are additional opportunities as Committee Coordinators:

Bus Tours Coordinator: Select and schedule cultural tours; arrange for transportation; collect fees from participants

Semi-annual Book Sale Coordinator: Coordinate and supervise two sales per year under the direction of the Book Sales VP

Publicity Coordinator: Write press notices and get them published in the local newspapers; increase public awareness of the Friends; direct web site contractor; develop social media

Newsletter Editor: solicit articles for, build, and publish our bimonthly newsletter, *FTOL Focus*

Special Programs Coordinator: Organize and sell books at Friends sponsored events (usually author events at the library)

THOUSAND OAKS LIBRARY FOUNDATION PRESENTS

Award-Winning Music Historian to Speak about Crooners

Allison McCracken, the author of the award-winning *Real Men Don't Sing: Crooning in American Culture*, will discuss her book about the rise and decline of crooning stars on Thursday, April 5, at 7 p.m.

Sponsored by the Thousand Oaks Library Foundation, the presentation will be held in the Marvin V. Smith Community Room in the Grant R. Brimall Library, 1401 E. Janss Road, Thousand Oaks.

"Crooning" was a style of vocalizing that became popular beginning in the mid-to-late 1920s with the advent of electrical recording, which was made possible by the invention of the microphone. The microphone allowed singers to perform songs with a greater intimacy than in the old acoustical process, giving rise to romantic-style vocals by such artists as Gene Austin, Nick Lucas, Russ Columbo, and the masters of the genre, Rudy Vallée and Bing Crosby.

McCracken will focus in particular on the rise of crooner Rudy Vallée, America's first pop idol.

His intense female fandom produced major objections from cultural authorities, who feared having a voice they considered effeminate representing American manhood. Vallée and his fans thus became subjects of public attacks by

church leaders, educators, and psychologists, who claimed they were "immoral," "pathological," and appealed only to "hysterical females." In her discussion, McCracken will show how the attacks on Vallée established the blueprint for the devaluation and ridicule of youthful male popidols that persists today, with those few singers who are able to survive —like Bing Crosby—adapting to conservative middle class values of white masculinity and distancing themselves from their female audiences.

An associate professor of American Studies at DePaul University in Chicago, McCracken is in Thousand Oaks to continue her research with the extraordinary Vallée collection in the Thousand Oaks Library Foundation's American Radio Archives. She first visited the archive over 20 years ago, in 1997, and has returned several times since then to gather information and images for *Real Men Don't Sing*. Her archival work here is widely acknowledged as having established Rudy Vallée as a major figure in American popular culture.

Named one of the "Great Reads of 2015" by NPR's Book Concierge, *Real Men Don't Sing* has also received several other awards including co-winner of the Best First Book Award from the Society for Cinema and Media Studies, the Irving Lowens Book Award from the Society for American Music, and the Woody Guthrie Prize from the international Association for the Study of Popular Music – United States.

The program is free and open to the public. Refreshments will be served.
